Upcoming Jayhawk Battalion Events

On April 9, 2016 the Jayhawk Battalion will host the 22nd annual Ranger Buddy Competition at Sesquicentennial Point, Lawrence, KS. We expect at least 188 two-person teams from ROTC programs coast-to-coast to participate in the one day event. The day starts before dawn at around 0445 hours. Cadets will start the day's competition with the 10K Ruck March (which is also a qualifying event). After the ruck march Cadets will go through situational lanes that focus on technical and tactical skills that challenge cadets' mental agility and problem-solving skills under pressure. Some of the challenges the Cadets will have to face are how to send up reports, how to negotiate an obstacle, land navigation, combat life-saving skills, troop leading procedures, and movement techniques, amongst other physical and mental challenges. The day will culminate with a 2-3 mile buddy run. Ultimately three teams in each category, male/male, female/female, and male/female teams will place and receive awards. As always, friends of the Jayhawk Battalion are welcome to join us as spectators at Sesquicentennial Point for this year's Ranger Buddy Competition. Greetings from the Jayhawk Navy!

The spring semester is in full force and the unit has been busy with guest speakers and multiple events. The unit played host to RADM Jeffery R. Penfield, as well as the CO and CMC of the USS Jacksonville (SSN -699). Officer Candidate (OC) Anthony Reid attended the Black Engineer of the Year Awards (BEYA), and three of our senior midshipmen formally selected their first duty stations.

RADM Jeffery R. Penfield is Commander Operational Test and Evaluation Force, and our Aviation Flag Officer sponsor. During his visit to KU he addressed the Battalion and dispensed valuable insight into the capabilities and technologies that our newest vessels, airplanes, and submarines will provide to future officers. He also discussed the importance good mentors can have on a successful career, and described strategies of how to seek out and find the right mentor.

CDR Stephen Faulk, the Commanding Officer of USS Jacksonville and his Chief of the Boat (COB), provided a presentation on "life as a submariner" to our nuclear interested midshipmen. In addition our students were

given time to talk one-on-one with CDR Faulk to ask detailed questions on how to succeed in their future community. Midshipmen also were able to discuss with the COB the relationships between officers and enlisted in general, and how



Chief Petty Officers are instrumental in developing junior officers.

We were honored to send Officer Candidate (OC) Anthony Reid to the BEYA conference in Philadelphia, PA. OC Reid (who is selected for submarines) was introduced to many former and current Navy leaders, including Dr. William F. Bundy, from the Naval War College and the USTRATCOM Commander, ADM Cecil D. Haney. At the conference OC Reid was also given the opportunity to attend the Centennial Seven Submarine mentoring session. Attending events such as this, so early in their careers, can be instrumental in preparing our midshipmen for the challenges of the Fleet. The end of February was an exciting time for three of our midshipmen who were awaiting ship and duty station selections. MIDN Sydney Jourdan, a Navy Nurse, chose Naval Medical Center San Diego as her first duty station. Our two future Surface Warfare Officers also selected their first ships. Officer Candidate Kyle Kaplan selected the USS Wayne E. Meyer (DDG 108) out of San Diego, and MIDN Nicholas Castans chose the Jason H. Dunham (DDG 109) out of Norfolk. All three can look forward to bright futures!

In the first week of March, for the first time in four years, we will be competing in the University of Colorado drill meet. This is a great opportunity for our midshipmen to display the skills they have worked so hard to perfect.

Hello from Detachment 280, the Flying Jayhawks!

We've hit the ground running in the Spring Semester with several training events geared towards preparing sophomore cadets to attend Field Training. This includes everything from marching, physical fitness, leadership development, expeditionary Air Force concepts, and hygienic rules for training such as the proper method for making your bunk and folding your clothes. Cadets will spend two-weeks in-garrison at Maxwell AFB, Alabama and two-weeks in an Air Expeditionary Force (AEF) environment at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. Sophomore cadets are currently competing for enrollment allocations to attend Field Training.

From a staff perspective we had several field training selections. I will attend AEF 1 at Camp Shelby as the Director of Support. Capt Rogers was selected as an alternate Flight Training Officer for AEF 1 as well. SSgt Anna Romero will attend AEF 2 as one of the NCO staff. It's great news for our staff to have so many people selected and it will certainly improve the training for future cadets.

The highlight of the semester so far is scholarship awards! Cadet Velia Colunga from Benedictine College and Cadets Shogun Thomas and Daniel Staudacher from the University of Kansas were recipients of a Type-II Air Force ROTC scholarship for sophomore cadets. This competitive scholarship covers \$18,000 in tuition per year and includes books and stipend payments.

Detachment update:

Three cadets were selected for rated duty assignment with Detachment 280 scoring 100% (3 out of 3 candidates) selections. Cadet Dale Hupe and Alexander Pruss were selected for pilot slots and Cadet Adam Hopkins was selected for an Air Battle Manager slot.

Coming Up:

We are hosting an AFROTC Open House on Saturday, 9 April from 0900 - 1200. This is an opportunity for local area high schools, JROTC units or current college students to check out Air Force ROTC. Parents are also encouraged to attend and lunch will be provided for the attendees. We are hoping for a large turnout in another effort to grow the numbers of incoming freshmen cadets.
